## Introduction

The annual report provides a snapshot of the services delivered during 2021/2022 and a range of performance based and other statistics for this period.

The Richmond Tweed Regional Library (RTRL) Deed of Agreement (DOA) section 7.10 requires an annual report be prepared and distributed. The annual report satisfies the requirements of the DOA.

It was a challenging year for the libraries with changes in COVID-19 restrictions impacting service delivery again this year. Various lockdowns across the region and the requirement for proof of vaccination status provided challenges for library staff and the community. Security guards temporarily operated in the branches to assist with managing challenging behaviour due to the opposition to vaccination requirements for library entry. These challenges paled in comparison to the massive damage and loss suffered by the Lismore Library and Mobile Library as a result of the devastating February 2022 severe weather event and flooding. Tweed Heads and Murwillumbah libraries also suffered minor damage. All libraries supported their communities throughout this challenging time as every RTRL local government area (LGA) was impacted.

With the great challenges came an overwhelming outpouring of love and support from the Australian community for the libraries and the people who live here. In response to the loss of over 33,228 books on the first floor of the Lismore Library, the Mobile Library, and Tweed Heads children's collections, people from right across Australia donated their books, or purchased new books, to restock the collections lost. Donations were also shared across RTRL's LGAs and further afield to give to schools, preschools, families, and individuals who had also lost their books and personal libraries. Over \$247,000 has been donated from individuals and organisations to the RTRL gift recipient account to support the recovery of the libraries, in particular, Lismore Library.

The Mobile Library trailer was damaged beyond repair due to floodwater inundation. The lack of the semi-trailer didn't halt Mobile Library services, with staff utilising the library station wagon and Popup Library resources to continue the service albeit at significantly reduced book carrying capacity. Considering much of the Mobile Library service area was impacted by flooding, it was important to offer service continuity and support for the community. The semi-trailer was replaced using insurance money and the full service reinstated in late July.

Lismore Library maintained services as much as possible with Goonellabah Library increasing opening hours, stock, and staff as well as a Popup Library co-locating with the Research and Family History Centre at Support Services in Goonellabah. Popup library events were held in conjunction with Trees Not Bombs and the Lismore Carboot Markets in the carpark at the Lismore Library site.

Good Things Foundation made grants available to allow the libraries to supply people aged over 50 years who were flood affected with loans of either iPads or laptops including data to support people through recovery. Devices were available for one month loans in Lismore, Ballina and Tweed areas.

Ballina and Murwillumbah Libraries were successful in receiving Public Library Infrastructure grants to improve amenities and facilities such as upgrading the air conditioning at Ballina Library and updating the Children's Area, Study Room and circulation area at Murwillumbah Library. Tweed Heads Library

utilised insurance money as a result of storm damage to repair the roof and refurbish the children's area and collections.

RTRL welcomed two new Area Librarians to the Tweed and Ballina Areas with the Lismore Area Librarian continuing in the Regional Library Manager role until recruitment for the role can be completed in 2023.

#### **Online Library Usage**

The Library provides access to thousands of online resources including encyclopaedias and research databases which include access to thousands of journal and newspaper articles supporting research at all levels through Britannica Library and Gale databases.

Through our eLibrary platforms, Libby Overdrive, Bolinda BorrowBox, and Indyreads, the library provides access to over 12,236 eBooks, 38,840 eAudiobooks and 4,061 eMagazines. Loans for the eLibrary platforms for the year were 242,082 It is not possible to differentiate and report use between the four council areas due to the way the platforms collect user data. Library staff continue to work with our eLibrary providers to improve reporting.

Online resources and platforms can be accessed through the RTRL website or Library App.

In addition to the Online Library resources, RTRL maintains a number of social media channels to connect with the community.

#### 7.10.8 An assessment of the quality of the Library Services delivered to each Member Council measured against performance benchmarks in the RTRL Strategic Plan and RTRL Delivery Program and the SLA applying to the Member Council.

RTRL has a strategic plan adopted by the Regional Library Committee. At this stage, the Delivery Plan and Service Level Agreements were not in use in 2021/22. 

Image 13: Children's activities at Byron Bay Library













#### S11. Acquisitions per Capita 20/21

#### S12a. Age of Collection 20/21






#### S12b. Age of Collection 20/21






#### S13. Turnover of Stock 20/21

#### 7.10.10 Other matter reasonably required by the RTRL Committee

#### COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic had widespread impacts on the entire community including the Richmond Tweed Regional Library (RTRL). RTRL was required to close library branches, and still deliver library services. The Click and Collect model proved to be the most successful way to still provide library services during this time. After COVID-19 service interruptions from March 2020, all library branches re-opened on Wednesday, 10 November 2021.

#### Staff Review and Service Delivery Model Investigations

The RTRL Deed of Agreement requires the review of library staffing to assess whether any library staff should be employed directly by Member Councils. An initial review was completed and reported to the RTRL Committee (Committee) in November 2020. The Committee resolved that further investigations were to be undertaken.

The detailed investigations were completed by the Senior Leadership Group (SLG). The SLG determined the range of information required, reviewed all the information collated and distributed by Lismore City Council, and interpreted all information provided for its application to a cooperative library model; and agreed on the findings and recommendations to the Committee.

The Committee resolved that at this time, no further action be taken to implement a cooperative library model, and the review of library staffing required by the Deed of Agreement is complete.

#### February and March 2022 Flood Impact

#### Lismore Library

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In February 2022, the Wilson River reached a peak, 14.4 metres, taking flood water into the 1st floor of the library destroying everything in that floor. 29,101 items were thrown out of the windows, a loss of \$560,134.00. Furniture, shelving, technology, flooring, all equipment in the communications room, the air conditioning, electrical, security and fire panel boxes were all situated on this floor and were destroyed. The building again had water enter the building on 30 March, but this time only on the ground floor.

Lismore Library is closed with estimates being prepared to determine the costs to bring the building into operation. The building has been assessed by structural engineers contracted by Lismore City Council and the structural report allows only staff and contractors to access the building.

Library services in the Lismore City Council local government area were conducted at Goonellabah Library, a much smaller Library. Lismore Library is 1500 square metres while Goonellabah Library is 120 square metres. Programs continued with the need to return to normal library services for the community. The Support Services building supported the Lismore service. Shelving was installed in the Family History and Research area for Library users to browse and borrow materials. Programs with larger attendances, such as the weekly Craft group, Young Writers workshops, Youth Book clubs, were held in this building.






Image 21: Lismore Library flood clean up

Book donations to restock the Lismore Library, and the replacement of damaged stock for the Mobile Library and Tweed Heads Library were delivered to Support Services. Library staff and volunteers sorted these donations, catalogued, and processed items into the collections of these branches. All Lismore stock was allocated to Goonellabah branch to meet demand as the original Goonellabah stock count was small. Publishers, authors, schools, members of the public participated in the drive to restock the libraries. The drive was initiated by the community when the photograph shown on the left of the pile of books outside the library went viral.

Publishers, such as Pearson, and charities, including 123Read2Me and Dolly Parton's Imagination Library, sent materials to be shared between multiple libraries to assist children throughout the community. A partnership between RTRL, schools, preschools, and childcare centres was developed to share donated resources across flood affected communities. The responses to book and financial assistance have been overwhelming. Donations are arriving at all branches, with staff sorting and processing donated items at all branches.

#### Mobile Library

Unfortunately, the rear of the Mobile Library trailer was damaged by flood water. The trailer was written off and 402 items were damaged by the flood water entering the trailer, at a cost of \$8,270. Staff pursued a short term mobile library trailer replacement option and the Committee resolved to acquire a 2007 Custom Semi Mobile Library from SemiTrailerSales.com for \$126,489 including GST funded from the insurance claim settlement. The semi-trailer service recommenced in July/August 2022.

As an interim measure, mobile library services resumed on Monday 21 March following the normal timetable utilising the RTRL station wagon and Popup Library resources. This ensured continuity of service and maintained strong links with the community, many of whom were significantly flood affected themselves. Although able to carry only a small number of items, the community was extremely appreciative of the service with new members even signing up. Whilst there was a decline in service use across Ballina, Byron and Tweed, in the Lismore LGA the number of people accessing the service significantly increased. This can be attributed to the limited access to library services at a branch in Lismore.

#### Support Services

This building experienced water leaks in numerous locations. The removal of a pine tree has taken place as its needles block the box guttering and causes water to overflow into the internal roof area and leak through the ceiling panels.

#### Ballina Library

Whilst the water went up and down from the tides, flood waters did not enter the building.

#### Tweed Heads Library

Tweed Heads Library had a major water leak in the ceiling with the Easy Reads and Junior Nonfiction impacted. 363 items were damaged and were discarded. The total cost is \$16,367.00. The roof has since been repaired and collection items replaced.

#### Murwillumbah Library

Murwillumbah Library had flood water enter the building at the front door and creep to the circulation desk and around the wall to the public PCs. It crept over the carpet but did not gain height to damage furniture or books. This water was removed with an industrial cleaner.

#### **Byron Library**

Byron Library had flood water to the front steps on 30 March, but no damage.

#### **Service Level Agreements**

Service level agreements (SLA) have been developed for RTRL services provided by the Executive Council to Member Councils. The SLA defines the range and standards of services to be offered. The SLAs are intended to quantify key services provided, not all services provided. Full details of all services is provided in the RTRL Core Activity Statement. The SLAs and RTRL Core Activity Statement have been developed by staff and the quality work is acknowledged by the RTRL Senior Leadership Group (SLG).

#### Deed of Agreement – Option to Extend Term by Twelve Months

The Richmond Tweed Regional Library Deed of Agreement (DOA), which creates and details the operating arrangements for the regional library service, had an amended expiry date of 30 June 2022 with a conditional option to extend the term to 30 June 2023. The RTRL Committee resolved to extend the DOA for another twelve months to 30 June 2023

A new Deed to continue the RTRL service from 1 July 2023 is being drafted. It is planned that the draft will be presented to the Senior Leadership Group and General Managers by October 2022 and reported to the RTRL Committee in November 2022. It is intended that the new DOA will be similar to the current DOA with the key changes being:

- Deed will be operational from 1 July 2023 to 30 June 2027
- The RTRL Committee is to hold not less than two (2) meetings each year.
- The total member council contribution increase each year is to be based on the annual base rate peg (excluding the individual rate peg population factor relevant for each council). It is acknowledged that due to population cost driver impacts, individual member council contributions may be above or below the rate peg.
- A proposal for changes in services or service levels which results in total member council contributions increasing above the rate peg limit may also be provided however they must be clearly stated, costed and how they are to be paid by a member council or member councils.
- Where the Executive Council is considering closing or significantly changing a Member Council service due to a staff or customer work, health and safety concern, the Executive Council must consult with the Member Council Senior Leadership Group representative as part of the process to determine an agreed risk-based approach and available options to respond to the work, health and safety concern and customer service impacts.
